LETTER FROM THE COLLEGE OF BISHOPS; PASTORAL LETTER TO VESTRIES

To the clergy, churchwardens, and parishioners of the Diocese of Toronto,

Dear friends,

Followers of Jesus, inspired by the Holy Spirit, serve the world God loves.

Simple and elegant. These few words capture the essence of a Vision that we have been pursuing and discerning throughout the Cast the Net process, a visioning exercise that began while we were still in pandemic mode. Over the course of several consultations, we listened to one another, and for the leading of the Holy Spirit. With time, sifting and testing, 20 Calls were revealed at Synod, which were supported with enthusiasm. A final version of the Calls will be received by Synod Council in February. We continue to be grateful to the Steering Committee and consultants, who have led our work together over the past 18 months. And now the work begins to incorporate these Calls into the life and ministry of the whole Diocese. This is the time for parishes large and small, missions, ministries, committees and Synod Council to animate the Calls in our own contexts. It is almost impossible for one community to embrace all twenty, but by serving together from Mississauga to Brighton, Midland to Minden, and all points in between, we can!

We begin this journey with a Season of Spiritual Renewal. We embrace the Call to deepen our walk together as communities by immersing ourselves in prayer, reading and reflection on scripture, worship and sharing our stories of faith with one another. As we promised in our baptism: we will "continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers". This Season will be supported by the Rev. Canon Dr Judy Paulsen, members of a steering committee and the College of Bishops. We hope that you will be able to join us for Diocesan worship events, learning opportunities, programs and fellowship that entice us all to walk more closely in the footsteps of Jesus.

We are delighted to reach across our borders to deepen our friendship with the Diocese of Brasilia. Brasilia is a relatively new diocese, birthed in 1985, with a small number of parishes, missions and ministries. We were delighted to welcome their Bishop Mauricio Andrade and his wife Sandra to our Diocesan Synod in November. We will learn from, grow with, and support one another as we strive to serve Christ in our unique circumstances. And we look forward to opportunities for delegations of our clergy and laity to visit back and forth, both in-person and online, as we deepen our affection for one another.

We are proud of and amazed at the ministry taking place across our Diocese, especially in the areas of youth, ecumenism, creation care, diversity, and faith formation. We encourage you to consider this year's Diocesan Social Justice motion on housing, and to prayerfully support our Church's advocacy for every person's right to adequate shelter. We are convinced that the Holy Spirit is leading and guiding us, and challenging us to bravely find new ways to work and worship together, to increase in courage, to share our passion for the Good News of Jesus, and to seek and find new meaning as followers of Christ in the 21st century, where we are confronted with emerging economic and social challenges. We want to express our heartfelt thanks to all who make up our dynamic community of faith – lay people, deacons, priests – all helping to give a glimpse of the Reign of God as it unfolds in our midst.

As your bishops, we know the joy and privilege of serving the Church in this Diocese. We thank all those who have joined us in giving leadership over the past year. We have recently celebrated one year of our new diocesan leadership model, and we are immensely grateful to our new Territorial Archdeacons and Canon Administrator for stepping into their roles so effectively and with such faithfulness. The five of them have helped to ease the bishops' administrative load, allowing us to focus on some of the other work to which we have been called and ordained.

Whether your work is changing this year, whether you are stepping out of your role at this Vestry meeting, or stepping into a new ministry, or continuing on in your good work, please know that we are here to support you in every way we can. We want to encourage you in Gospel ministry, in the initiatives and relationships that you are building, as you cast your nets ever wider in a world that is hungry for Christ - for meaning, connection and belonging. Our mission statement is simple and elegant. And it invites us, like the dismissal at the close of the Eucharist, to action. We invite you to incorporate these words in your liturgies on Sunday morning:

6. Presentation and Adoption of the Churchwardens' Financial Report for 2022

7. Presentation and Adoption of Priorities and Plans for 2024 (including Budget) Sydney Baxter-Dennis presented the draft budget for 2023

- Questions regarding the budget for 2023
 - Mary Beth Moffatt-Sinclair
 - Are we being presumptuous that we expect people who didn't hand in their forms to donate in 2023?
 - A number of people consistently donate each year, although they may not fill out any forms. We are seeking to supplement our revenue with additional grant funding.
 - Tim Wiebe
 - Where does the money in the unrestricted fund go?
 - It is to be used as directed by Corporation with the advice of the Ministry Leaders Team to best serve the vision and mission of the parish. It increased in 2022 due to a memorial gift.

- Are you confident in our draft givings budgeted? Or is that an aspirational figure to achieve?
 - It is somewhat aspirational, but we did have a \$10,000 increase in pledging for our Giving Our Thanks & Praise
- Why has 'outreach other' gone up so much in this year?
 - Our food cupboard has expanded and we have received more funding to support the community
- Why was the actual tenant income so low in 2022?
 - They came in part of last year. In 2023 they will be in for the full vear.
- What is "income deferred from previous years"?
 - Grant money we didn't spend last year and we are moving into 2023
- How are we ensuring that we can keep our head above water in 2023?
 - We have accounted for the rate of inflation and other external factors in this budget.
- Beverley Byrne MacPhee
 - What is are professional fees?
 - Cost of the auditor and a small legal fee for a contractor we had in 2022. Typically, it is just the cost of an auditor.
- Leslie Hetherington
 - Was an estimation made for people who didn't get their form in time?
 - There are some subjective calculations made, however it is done
 with great consideration. Over the past 4 years our budget has
 been very close to actual. Our envelope secretary also gives
 guidance to help create an amount, by looking at what was given in
 general offerings each week in 2022.
 - How successful was the Earth's Angels TruEarth campaign?
 - They have raised approximately \$400 in 2022.
 - Is \$17,000 market value for a music director?
 - Myron believes it is still a competitive wage. We pay to RCCO scale. However, we will find out a final answer once we hire.
- Flo Schwerdtner
 - Thank you, Michael J and Ryan S, for doing so much of our contract work for free.

The Rev. Canon Stephen Kirkegaard confirmed that Vestry approves the appointment of the auditor even though this is a paid position.

Volunteer Ministry Positions, as presented in the Vestry report, were confirmed by the Incumbent. Thank you Eva McLean for taking on the Flower ministry with Karen Price in 2023.

Vacancies in certain ministry areas were noted. Efforts to find people to take on these roles will continue. All are asked to give these opportunities their prayerful consideration.

Raise the Rates - Ellen Anderson

We, the vestry of Holy Trinity, Guildwood urge the provincial government to support Ontario's most vulnerable citizens by doubling social assistance rates for both Ontario Works and the Ontario Disability Support Program, and thereafter to index these rates to inflation, so as to provide a safety net that enables people to meet their most basic needs.

 - We are hoping to hang up a screen in the narthex so we can start hybrid meetings. Screens in the sanctuary would cost about \$20,000. We are investigating options to secure relevant funding and expertise.

- o Can we put our call and responses on the live stream?
 - Unfortunately, we cannot do that right now because we don't have a live stream host. You can follow along in the bulletin which is linked in the video description. A chat host would be most welcome.

Mary Beth

- Brought up COVID regulations from the Diocese of Toronto and a letter from Bishop Andrew. Have we as a community decided to stop wearing a mask or was it a unilateral decision?
 - In consultation with the Diocesan COVID Health Officer, Holy Trinity Guildwood's Parish Nurses, Wardens, Ministry Leaders Team, and listening to people of varying perspectives in our congregation, The Rev. Canon Stephen Kirkegaard has sought to lead Holy Trinity, Guildwood in a process and way of worship in accordance with evolving Diocesan and Provincial Health guidelines while also making special accommodations for those with specific needs.
- O Why was there not a vote?
 - This topic will be brought up at the next ministry team leaders meeting.

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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Vestry of the Church of the Holy Trinity, Guildwood:

Qualified Opinion

I have audited the financial statements of the Church of the Holy Trinity, Guildwood (the "Church"), which comprise the balance sheet as at December 31, 2023, and the statements of revenue and expenditures, changes in net asset balances and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In my opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of my report, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Church as at December 31, 2023, and the results of its operations and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Accounting Standards for Notfor-profit Organizations (ASNPO).

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many not-for-profit organizations, the Church derives revenue from fundraising activities, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Church. Therefore, I was unable to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to fundraising revenue, excess of revenues over expenses, and cash flows from operations for the years ended December 31, 2023 and December 31, 2022, current assets and net assets as at December 31, 2023 and December 31, 2022. My audit opinion on the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2022 was modified accordingly because of the possible effects of this limitation in scope.

I conducted my audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I am independent of the Church in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to my audit of the financial statements in Canada, and I have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with ASNPO, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Church's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going-concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Church or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit
 procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an
 opinion on the effectiveness of the Church's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Church's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Church to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the
 disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and
 events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.

Description of activities

The Church of the Holy Trinity, Guildwood (the "Church") is a parish church within the Diocese of Toronto ("the Diocese"). Each parish church of the Anglican Church in the Province of Ontario is a separate corporation pursuant to "The Church Temporalities Act," given Royal Assent on December 3, 1841, and as later enacted pursuant to "An Act respecting Churchwardens in the Diocese of Toronto".

The Church is a registered charitable organization and is exempt from income tax.

Holy Trinity, Guildwood offers a warm, caring, and inclusive community that celebrates the love of God and the good news of Jesus Christ. We emphasize traditional and innovative worship, an inquiring exploration of faith, rewarding fellowship, and an imperative to make a difference through service to our community and beyond.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

a) Basis of Presentation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. Outlined below are those policies considered significant for the Church.

b) Fund accounting

The Church follows the principles of fund accounting, under which resources for particular purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds, corresponding to those purposes. Any transfers between funds are authorized by the Churchwardens in accordance with the requirements and restrictions of the funds from which the funds are transferred. These financial statements present the following funds.

Unrestricted operating fund

The Operating Fund includes revenue and expenses for the operation and ministry of the Church and the rectory.

Externally restricted funds

"3R" - Repair, Replacement and Renewal Fund - includes designated offerings, and the related expenditures for the maintenance of the Church or the rectory.

Our Faith - Our Hope Fund - relates to donations to the Diocesan Our Faith - Our Hope campaign. These donations were made by the donor directly to the Diocese, which then returned a portion to the Church to use in its own Our Faith - Our Hope parish program. A total of \$109,554 was received under this program.

Missional Outreach and Discipleship Fund - includes revenue and expenditures for an intergenerational program to provide support, leadership, religious and social education to parishioners and the broader Guildwood community. The Diocese has awarded a grant of \$200,000 to the Church for this ministry growth program. The grant will be disbursed to the Church in stages from 2022 through 2025, following Diocesan review of the program's progress against the benchmarks laid out in the Church's approved grant proposal.

b) Fund accounting (continued)

Other restricted funds:

Jim and Rachael Boles Choir Fund - includes designated donations intended for the Church's music program.

Vivien Harris Parish Nursing and Outreach Fund - includes donations intended to expand the work of parish nursing within the parish and ecumenically with wider community partnerships. Although the Fund was primarily founded to honour parish nursing activities, donations may be used for general outreach activities.

c) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash on hand, balances with banks, and other highly liquid investments with maturity dates of less than one year.

d) Revenue Recognition

The Church follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions. Contributions which are externally restricted by the donors are recorded in the appropriate restricted fund in the year received. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the operating fund in the year received.

Revenue from fundraising activities is recognized in the period that the related event takes place.

e) Capital Assets

The Church is exempt from recording tangible capital assets as its revenues in the current and prior year meet the threshold for exemption. Capital assets are expensed as incurred, and an amount of \$6,272 (2022 - \$3,202) has been expensed in the current year. Refer to the Schedule of Expenses on pages 9 and 10 for details as to the nature of these expenditures. Note that the Diocese holds the title to the church and rectory land and buildings.

This accounting policy represents a change from prior years where purchased property and equipment, with a cost in excess of \$1,000, was recorded at cost if it did not replace an existing item or represent a major improvement. All items capitalized under this policy were fully depreciated by December 31, 2014.

f) Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the recognition, measurement and disclosure of amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. The reported amounts and note disclosures are determined using management's best estimates based on assumptions that reflect the most probable set of economic conditions and planned courses of action. Actual results may differ from such estimates as additional information becomes available in the future.

g) Non-monetary transactions

Management of the Church estimates that voluntary members provide approximately 4,600 hours of time without compensation.

2. Long term investment

The Church has invested \$12,000 in the Consolidated Trust Fund of the Diocese of Toronto, in the name of the Vivien Harris Parish Nursing & Outreach Fund. This investment is being accounted for at cost. The market value at December 31, 2023 was \$13,072 (2022 -\$11,883).

3. Unearned revenue

The Church has entered into a one year licence agreement, ending on March 31, 2024 with Wellspring Community Centres Inc. for the use of certain areas of the Church. This licence was renewed on the same terms and conditions after the expiry date for an additional term of one year. The Church holds "in trust" an amount of \$2,500 as a deposit towards the last month's licence fee.

5. Diocesan funding and other grants

Missional Outreach and Discipleship grant

The Church has been awarded a grant from the Diocese in the total amount of \$200,000, to be paid out over 5 years (refer to Note 1(b)). An amount of \$40,000 (2022 -\$47,500) was received in the current year.

Food Cupboard grant

The Church received two grants totalling \$2,000 from the Scharnagl Family Fund, designated for its food cupboard.

Media Lab grant

In a prior year, the Church was awarded a \$5,750 grant from the Diocese to assist in the purchase of audiovisual equipment for a media lab. The media lab will be used for the Church Missional Outreach and Discipleship Ministry. An amount of \$380 has been recognized in the current year, with the balance remaining as deferred revenue.

Jubilee program

In response to the continuing Covid-19 crisis, the Diocese provided funding to the Parish to cover the Diocesan allotment for January 2022.

Grant to Support Anti-Hate Security Measures for Faith-Based & Cultural Organizations:

In the prior year, the Church received a grant of \$7,500 under this Government of Ontario grant program, of which one half was spent during the prior year on community building initiatives. The balance was spent during the current year. During the current year, the Church received an additional \$7,500 under this program, which is fully disclosed as deferred revenue.

6. Fundraising activities

The Church undertakes various fundraising activities, such as a spring yard sale, Guildwood Day lunch sales, and a fall bazaar, to support its activities. These events generated gross receipts in the operating fund of \$17,902 (2022- \$28,017) which were offset by disbursements of \$2,629 (2022 - \$10,125) for net receipts of \$15,273 (2022 - \$17,892) as reported on the Statement of Revenue and Expenditures.

7. Financial instrument risk

The Church has exposure to various risks through its financial instruments. The nature of the risks to which the Church may be subject are as follows:

Credit risk

The Church is exposed to credit risk resulting from the possibility that parties may default on their financial obligations, or if there is a concentration of transactions carried out with the same party or if there is a concentration of financial obligations which have similar economic characteristics such that they could be similarly affected by changes in economic conditions.

Credit risk associated with amounts receivable is minimized by the Church's policy of requiring monthly payments of facilities rental revenue.

Credit risk associated with cash and short-term investments is minimized substantially by ensuring that these assets are invested in financial obligations of financial institutions or governments that have been accorded investment grade ratings by a primary rating agency.

Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates. The Church mitigates this risk by investing in securities with maturity dates of less than one year.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Church will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The Church mitigates liquidity risk by closely monitoring its working capital position, ensuring sufficient cash and cash equivalents, are available to meet all liabilities when due.

SOCIAL JUSTICE VESTRY MOTION – PROTECTING AND ADVANCING THE RIGHT TO HOUSING

We, the parish of <u>Holy Trinity</u>, <u>Guildwood</u>, call on all levels of government to take the following measures to protect and advance the human right to housing:

- We call on the Government of Canada to ensure that federal subsidies and incentives are targeted to those developers and projects that demonstrably address housing need and uphold the human right to housing by meeting clear conditions on affordable rents, non-displacement policies and eviction prevention measures.
- We call on the Government of Canada to end the favourable tax treatment of Real Estate Investment Trusts (REITs) and tax them at the regular corporate rate, with resulting revenues being directed toward the creation and preservation of affordable housing.
- We call on the Province of Ontario to enact rent controls and vacancy controls on all rental housing and put restrictions on Above Guideline Rent Increases.
- We call on the Province of Ontario to work with municipal governments to enact and enforce restrictions on short-term rentals to protect rental housing stock.

Canada has ratified the human right to housing in multiple international treaties, including the Sustainable Development Goals. The National Housing Strategy Act (2019) commits the federal government to the progressive realization of the right to housing. This does not mean that the government guarantees everyone a home. What it does mean is that the government must do everything in its power to realize the right to housing for Canadians, including removing obstacles and barriers to the realization of that right.

Three key aspects of the right to housing are **affordability**, **security of tenure** and **habitability**. Affordability is threatened when housing costs exceed 30% of a household's pre-tax income. Security of tenure is threatened when people are subject to eviction for no fault of their own, such as expropriation or arbitrary eviction. Habitability is threatened when units are not kept in an adequate state of repair.

Most recent government policy around affordable housing, at both the federal and provincial levels, has focussed on supply. Considering that both levels of government stopped creating non-market housing in the 1990's, we have a 30-year deficit in that supply. Worse, we are losing existing affordable housing faster than it is being built. For every new affordable rental unit created between 2011 and 2016, 15 units were lost in the private rental sector. We cannot merely build our way out of the affordable housing crisis: we must also take measures to prevent the loss of existing affordable housing stock.

In the 1990's, as governments in Canada withdrew from investing in social housing, they also made several regulatory and legislative changes. These changes permitted the securitization of mortgages, removed restrictions on the type and location of assets pension plans could hold, and enabled the creation of Real Estate Investment Trusts (REITS), which provide investors with access to real estate income at a preferential tax rate. These changes have accelerated the acquisition of existing rental housing by corporate investors whose primary purpose is to minimize costs and maximize profits for shareholders, rather than to provide housing at a reasonable rate of return. This trend is known as the *financialization of housing*, and "is associated with rising rent levels, displacement pressure, impacts on tenant quality of life, higher rates of eviction, and gentrification."²

The pressure to minimize costs while maximizing profits for shareholders has adverse impacts on affordability, habitability, and security of tenure for tenants of corporate landlords. Routine maintenance and upkeep of buildings is often neglected or deferred while money is invested in cosmetic improvements that allow landlords to apply successfully for above-guideline rent increases. Tenants suffer from neglect of needed repairs and upkeep, disruptive construction, repeated above-guideline increases, and both legal and extra-legal tactics, including harassment, that pressure them to leave their units. Indeed, financial firms strategically pursue "turnover" of tenants to benefit from vacancy decontrol (the opportunity to raise rents between tenancies.) This puts a strain on the mental and physical health of tenants while putting their security of tenure in jeopardy. These harmful effects are disproportionately experienced by people who are Indigenous, racialized, disabled, and newcomers to Canada, as well as those on low or fixed incomes – the same "vulnerable groups" that the National Housing Strategy is designed to assist.³

Some corporations buy up multiple rental units and divert them to the short-term rental market (e.g. AirBnB). This keeps these units from being accessible to local residents, and drives up rents in the area. It is happening in communities large and small, urban and rural alike.

Carol, a renter in Toronto, lives in a building recently acquired by a REIT. She describes "a real struggle getting any work done", with pest control, break-ins, and a non-functioning elevator being ongoing problems, while the owner was granted back-to-back above guideline increases. "We are always on edge because they have all the power and money to win things. It's exhausting for us," she says.⁴

Whitney is a mother of three who has been renting a house for five years in a small town with a very low rental vacancy rate. While her rent has been increasing each year as her landlord makes upgrades and applies above guideline rent increases, her own income has not been getting upgraded. Whitney is worried: "If the rent goes up anymore, I don't think we'll be able to stay—where will we go?"

Nicole leads an outreach team in a small community, supporting people experiencing homelessness. She recently realized how precarious her own housing is. After over 10 years of renting a house, she and her husband were given sixty days to vacate as the landlord elected to put the property up for sale. Nicole and her husband could not afford to purchase it and so, with limited options, short notice, and high prices, they had to leave the community to find housing. While Nicole continues to lead outreach work in the community she loves, she now commutes to work. It turns out the landlord didn't sell the house after all - it is being rented again to new tenants at a new (higher) price. Nicole says, "Thankfully we were able to live with my parents for a few months until we could find a place. If it can happen to us, it can happen to anyone."

Protecting and advancing the right to housing for people like Carol, Whitney, Nicole and their families means removing the barriers to housing that is affordable, habitable, and does not expose renters to arbitrary eviction. To make this happen, governments should ensure that public funds are targeted to the creation and preservation of housing that commits to those principles. Real Estate Investment Trusts, which have been shown to erode the right to housing, should be taxed at the regular corporate rate, which would make hundreds of millions of dollars in revenue available for creating and preserving truly affordable housing⁶ The province must end the vacancy decontrol loophole, which gives landlords an incentive to evict tenants, and work with municipalities to create and enforce restrictions on short-term rental operators so valuable units are not removed from the rental market.

Scripture recognizes the human need for shelter, security and dignity. Isaiah 32:18 reads, "My people will abide in a peaceful habitation, in secure dwellings, and in quiet resting places." If Canada is a country truly committed to realizing the right to housing, our laws and policies must reflect this commitment.

We thought it would be used well there, as the Altar Guild does a weekly setup. The bins can be moved easily as needed.

Thank you to everyone who has been contributing their reusable items to our baskets in the narthex. The ongoing collection of egg cartons, outer milk bags, eyeglasses, hearing aids and stamps results in those items being reused or repurposed, rather than discarded. For example, the milk bags are given to the Chartwell residence next door and turned into sleeping mats for underdeveloped countries. Thank you to Marilyn Lind for her work in collecting these items and delivering them to the appropriate organizations.

FaithWorks is an initiative of the Diocese of Toronto in which parishioners fund a host of especially good works helping the homeless, the poor, refugees, and many other disadvantaged people in the Diocese. FaithWorks also partners with the Primates' World Relief and Development Fund (PWRDF) to provide international humanitarian assistance.

This year, Denise Byard coordinated a special Christmas Concert in partnership with Alexandra Weiss, raising donations for both FaithWorks and The Sisterhood of St. John the Divine (SSJD). Concert proceeds went to FaithWorks for PWRDF's Emergency Response Fund for victims of war in Gaza. Concert proceeds also went to SSJD's Home for the Heart Campaign to repair and renew its spiritual retreat Guest House in Toronto. At the concert, Archbishop Fred Hiltz presented an inspiring message about these ministries, and \$1,885 was raised.

The concert entertainment featured Denise Williams, Jan Morgan, Ben MacDonald, Ensemble, Twylite Caribbean Band, as well as Holy Trinity Choir Members and Master of Ceremonies Randy Vancourt.

Holy Trinity, Guildwood also receives ongoing monthly donations for FaithWorks from parishioners so the total donation to FaithWorks in 2023 was \$5,500. Of this total, \$600 was designated for FaithWorks' partnership with Toronto Urban Native Ministry and \$200 for FaithWorks' partnership with the Anglican United Refugee Alliance.



HOSPITALITY REPORT

The duties of a Hospitality Hour Facilitator/Convener are to make sure that there is a hot/cold beverage and light refreshment each Sunday. The Sunday hospitality encourages people to come in person to connect with those whom they have not seen face to face in a long time as well as to meet and get to know the new people in the parish. LAY ASSISTANTS AND CHALICE ADMINISTRATORS

Lay Assistants open the church for the first service and set out the items needed for the services. Then they say the Land Acknowledgement, read scriptures, lead prayers of the people and assist the Priest in preparing the elements for Eucharist. Hopefully, as we grow in numbers each member will be on duty once a month.

Approximately four schedules are presented throughout the year and most of our discussions and planning happen through emails.

We endeavour to follow health guidelines in order that everyone participating in the Eucharist feels safe and comfortable.



MISSIONAL OUTREACH AND DISCIPLESHIP

We have completed 3/5 of the Ministry Allocation Fund for the Lay Pastoral Associate which ends December 2025. I was honoured to be appointed a Lay Member of Synod by Bishop Andrew Asbil again this year. In preparing to transition ministry leadership, we welcome Melanie McLeod as our Youth Ministry Apprentice. Within this context, the youth leader will develop, nurture, and supervise a ministry that supports and stimulates youth to develop their faith and to become active members of a vibrant faith community. The Youth Ministry Apprentice, in conjunction with Church of the Holy Trinity Guildwood Anglican Church, serve to build relationships with both youth and the surrounding community. This function not only includes teaching of the scriptures and how they apply, but also creating opportunities for community service, outreach, and evangelism in Guildwood and beyond. Key functions: mentorships, fellowship, social justice, teamwork, teaching, discipleship, and evangelism.,

This expanded ministry of Missional Outreach and Discipleship allows Holy Trinity Guildwood to deepen our relationships within the community; create experiences to augment our worship; and strengthen our digital communications, as well as further our vision of building a fully vibrant, diverse, multicultural, and multi-generational self-sustaining parish with the young people and seniors of southeast Scarborough. Thanks to the grant, we will have an opportunity for the church to extend into the community and provide services that are not currently available to young people or seniors through shared in person and/or virtual activities and ministries. Outreach to the community additionally seeks to engage children, youth, families, and service providers to collaborate and connect to extend the ministry of the parish.

Summer Camp (Vacation Bible School) 2023

- This VBS invited children to pray as Jesus teaches us in Matthew 6:11; "Give us this
 day our daily bread." These words serve as a reminder that everything we have comes
 from God and that it's by turning to God in prayer that all our daily needs are met.
- It was a great success with 13 participants from our parish and the community. We held
 the camp outside on the church property and enjoyed beautiful weather for most of the
 week from July 10 to 14.
- Highlights were the food candy; music; dance parties; stories; friends; making lemonade, pizza dough, and flatbread; ending with slime, a magic show, and outdoor games (baseball and parachute), for the final day. The students were great helpers. Missional Events

We became part of the Community Food Centres Canada Good Food Organization program for 2023! We are committed to a healthy and fair food system! This program gives us access to resources and tools, virtual training, peer to peer knowledge-swap activities and an incredible network of like-minded organizations. We provide fresh bread once a week with occasional other fresh food deliveries. Holy Trinity, Guildwood's food pantry currently supports 30 community families with food, toiletry and cleaning items, and grocery gift cards. Community partners' generosity has kept our food pantry well stocked despite unprecedented use: Cob's Bread Bakery at Morningside Crossing, Rotary Club of Scarborough, residents of the Condos at 20 Guildwood Parkway, Chartwell Retirement Residence, Sir Wilfrid Laurier Collegiate Institute, Club 1 Studios, Goodlife Fitness Pickering, and concerned village residents. Thank you to many angels. especially Belinda Chin, Penny Case, Diane Hickman, Nancy Mills, as well as Bruce and Carol Gooding who regularly shop and contribute. Thank you to the bread organization helpers - Marion and Butch Byard, Wally and Ruth Kosciejew, Ruth Mattinson, Linda (Deanne) Hosin, Dupe Matiluko, Modupe, Tolu, and students (Rose, Meredith, Caleb, Daniel, and Nazia). To obtain ongoing stability and long-term impact, we endeavour to develop a support team which includes one coordinator to assist those in need. Shoppers are also welcomed to provide weekly high demand items. We had an average of 78.5 visits per month of the year from 30 different families.



- Saturday, June 10, 2023. It was a beautiful, sunny day for clergy, parishioners, and community to get to know people from other parishes and the buildings where they worship. Twenty-eight registrants formed eight teams and raced across the Scarborough Deanery in the Scarborough Steeplechase scavenger hunt, visiting 12 churches - all in support of the Primate's World Relief and Development Fund (PWRDF). Over \$700 was raised for the Fund. The participating churches included: Church of the Holy Trinity, Guildwood; St. Timothy, Agincourt; the Church of St. Jude, Wexford; St. Margaret in-the-Pines; Christ Church, Scarborough; Grace Church, Scarborough; Church of the Nativity, Malvern; Church of the Holy Wisdom; St. Paul, L'Amoreaux; St. Dunstan of Canterbury; the Church of St. Andrew; and St. Michael the Archangel. Each host church provided a different challenge/activity for teams. The scriptural theme for the day was I Corinthians 9:24-25, "You've all been to the stadium and seen the athlete's race. Everyone runs; one wins. Run to win. All good athletes train hard. They do it for a gold medal that tarnishes and fades. You're after one that's gold eternally". The race ended with a celebration and prizes at St. Timothy, Agincourt. One of the teams from St. Jude, Wexford won first prize; Church of the Holy Wisdom won second and third place went to St. Timothy, Agincourt. Thank you to Manita Swati from PWRDF for opening the Scarborough Steeplechase and to Bishop Andrew and Mary Asbil for handing out prizes at the closing ceremony. Thank you to Randy Vancourt as well as the St. Timothy, Agincourt Contemporary group for providing music during the opening and closing celebrations.
- Thank you to all who prayed, donated, came to support, and helped with the annual Family Day Winter Fair. We had 45 children and 35 adults. We had more than enough food, painting, winter themed crafts, games, a special magic show, and special treasures. All of this was made possible by the donation of time and items from so many people. • We had a great celebration with 65 packages prepared for the Feast of St. Nicholas. Social Justice Vestry Motion 2023 - Disability Without Poverty

 A big, big thanks to everyone who joined us at our Disability Without Poverty Town Hall on Thursday, June 1. We signed a dozen postcards that are being dropped off at a media event at Chrystia Freeland's constituency office on Friday, June 2 with the rest collected at other events.

- We did it! After months of emails, petitions, postcards, rallies and meetings with MPs and senators, Bill C-22 has finally passed in both the House of Commons and the Senate!
- The bill is expected to become law by the end of this week and will provide the government with a guiding framework as they work out all the details of what a new Canada Disability Benefit (CDB) will look like. The minister has said it could take up to a year to develop all the regulations and roll out the CDB to people with disabilities. People with disabilities can't afford to wait!
- 3,500+ postcards signed, 9 Members of Parliament met, and 29 events organized in communities across the country, sharing information about the Canada Disability Benefit and the Disability Without Poverty campaign with almost 4,000 community members! And that was just those of you who applied for the grant! CFCC distributed 40,000 postcards across our network.

Christian Education and Discipleship

- Church School continues to have a vital program, with 93 young people on our roster with whom we connect online and in person monthly. It was very special to have families participate in the Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany liturgy. Our average attendance has been very good with an average of 12.5 per week. I am truly grateful to Tanya Sanxhaku,
 - Aviyah Fubler, Melanie McLeod who assist and lead classes. We had a wonderful Christmas Eve intergenerational service. The skit and musical presentation at the Christmas Eve Service were fantastic. Thank you, Aviyah and Winnie, for coordinating. Stay tuned for the Palm Sunday spring presentation by the youth class.
- We had two baptisms this year welcoming the youngest from the John and Schanzenbacher families. I am so proud to announce that one of our young leaders has joined the Lay Assistant Team and began learning in December.
- Set Apart' En Route Children's Ministry Event was very good. I had the opportunity to connect with other ministry leaders in the area. It was good to have time to worship and be refreshed. The session I appreciated most was about intentionally forming the spiritual life of children and creating environments to assist in nurturing their personal, intimate relationship with God and his son Jesus.
- Adult catechesis included our bi-weekly Bible study, monthly discipleship class. Our seniors have expressed a deep appreciation of our in-person as well as online worship, biweekly bible study and monthly book club. These initiatives help them stay connected with others and combat the depression caused by prolonged social isolation.

The Youth's Take On 2023

What they did & learned in 2023

The youth years are the time where one grows their relationship with God. It is the time where we lay a strong foundation that lasts us through life by serving God. The main goal for many of the youth members in church is to "make a difference" and "learn something that leaves an impact." The best way to succeed in reaching that goal is to dedicate our time and innumerable skills to learning about the word of God, serving those in need, and volunteering to help during church events. For Holy Trinity Guildwood, 2023 was filled with numerous amusing and educational moments, especially for the youth.

BIBLE CAMP

In July of 2023, our church led a weeklong bible camp for the younger kids. The youth members of the church were given the opportunity to be a counselor and become a leader. Though the camp was for the young ones, the youth also learnt a lot from it. Many stories were told, including the one of Jesus feeding 5000 people. Within these lessons we learnt how God will always provide for us.

"I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never go hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty." John 6:35. "This verse shows us that as long as we trust in Jesus we will have what we need. This is one of the verses we learnt that stuck with me and many other youth leaders at the camp that week," Youth leader, Aviyah, mentions.

Though the camp taught us many things in relation to the bible and Jesus Christ, there was also time for fun. There were experimental, hands-on activities which include slime, making lemonade, pizza dough, etc. Besides that, there were fun games, crafts, lots of snacks, and even better, lots of candies. Overall, it was a fun experience filled with lots of laughter and learning.

Canadian Lutheran Anglican Youth Gathering (CLAY)

In August of 2023, the youth went to Laurier University to participate in an event called CLAY-where we are called to be light in our communities. At CLAY, we heavily talked about the importance of inclusiveness and creativity. At the event, there was a wide range of workshops but our youth group learned and acquired new understanding from specifically two: the 'Welcome a Stranger' and 'BIPOC' workshop.

'Welcome a Stranger' was a workshop that recognized refugees. In that workshop, through shared experiences, everyone realized that despite anyone's opinion or beliefs, God will always love us. "God wants us to welcome strangers, to not judge and to acknowledge them by including them in ways that make them feel welcomed," Ashley, a youth member on the trip, emphasizes. In the 'BIPOC' workshop, we learnt that there is still room for growth in the church when it pertains to expanding our knowledge and expressing creativity. In my opinion, the workshop taught us that individual growth is the base for creating change for the community.

The verse of the day was Psalm 139:13-14; "For you formed my inward parts; you knitted me together in my mother's womb. I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made.

Wonderful are your works; my soul knows it very well." That verse reminds us of the beautiful truth that we are fearfully and wonderfully made by God. Aviyah, another youth member on the trip, explains that "it is a powerful reminder of our inherent worth and value, no matter how unworthy we feel." The reason we gather in church every Sunday was clarified at CLAY; It's to build each other's relationships in faith and so no one feels alone in their struggles with nurturing a relationship with Christ.

CAMP MUSKOKA

In September of 2023, the youth girls at Holy Trinity spent time in Camp Muskoka. It was a place filled with lots of activities from basketball to rock climbing. Most importantly, during the time spent at the camp, the youth discussed the word of God. Saint Francis, the Saint of Animals, was talked about. During the retreat, there was a given time to discuss what the youth wanted for Holy Trinity and ways the future generation can continue to lead and improve. "It was an overall great experience and a great way to represent Holy Trinity," Ashley made note of.

CHRISTMAS CHURCH SKIT

Mary giving birth to Jesus is one the most important stories told in the bible. Due to that, the youth group of the church decided to perform a skit in relation to that. Throughout the year, not all members of the youth group had been able to participate in the events, but everyone was included for the skit. It was a fun experience for everyone to get to know each other better and spread the word of God to His creation. Personally, I can mention that we - all youth members in the church - had a wonderful time rehearsing and presenting our performance. All practices were filled with times for laughter and moments to reflect on the story being told. For the young people of the church, AKA the youth, it truly was a fun way to end the year off together.

In closing, the year 2023 was filled with a great amount of activities, new lessons, and moments for reflection. This year the young people learnt about looking at God's word from a more modern and relatable perspective. We learnt that there are fun ways to learn more about God and his teachings. In 2024, for all the young people at Holy Trinity, I'm sure there will be chances to grow our faith, attend more events, and volunteer at church. We all look forward to it.



YOUTH SYNOD REPORT

I went to Synod along with Rohelio as the youth delegates of Holy Trinity Guildwood. My title this year for Synod had changed. I wasn't just the youth member but I was the youth lay member for Holy Trinity Guildwood. We went for two days on November 17-18, 2023. We learned a lot of things at this synod but in my report, I will be giving the highlights of some of the things that we did at synod and what was talked about. We started with Eucharist and the Bishop's Charge to Synod and how the Bishop based his charge on John 21, the scriptural passage that undergirds Cast the Net, the Diocese's visioning and strategy process. He spoke about the initiatives coming out of Cast the Net, including the Season of Spiritual Renewal, of which the Rev. Canon Judy Paulsen will be the coordinator. He spoke about his hopes for a companionship program between the Diocese of Toronto and the Diocese of Brasilia, and his hope for the Diocese to engage in a capital campaign, with a feasibility study beginning in late 2024. He expressed his gratitude to all the clergy and lay leaders of the Diocese, staff and his wife Mary. Then the sponsors were thanked, Synod approved the council's report and we had lots of missional and outreach moments; we even had one from our very own church. Our main focus at Synod was "Cast the Net" and how it was going to be utilized over the next two years and what the plan is for that. I really enjoyed my time at Synod as I made a lot of new friends. I'm hoping to continue going to Synod in the next couple of years and learning a lot more. We had a breakout session and I chose to go to the breakout room called Children and Family Ministry, where we talked about things we can do to make our ministry better and start getting more children and families to join our ministry. After we gave our suggestions on what we can do to make our ministries better. The coordinator, Laura, took our suggestions and shared that she wants to do a Synod Children and Young Families conversation on some ministry topics such as: Beyond Sunday, Curriculum, Space Use and Intergenerational Ministry. The first topic will be about programs and ideas that reach children and young families beyond Sunday morning church programs. It will be a great chance to reach out to many of the people who are doing this ministry around the diocese and get their suggestions and feedback on what we can do to improve this ministry.

I had a lot of fun at Synod and I am very excited to see what topics we are going to cover next year.

IGNITE FAMILY MINISTRY REPORT

Ignite Family Ministry launched on March 15/16 after 3 months of intense planning and pitching the idea to Synod Council. Ignite is an outside-of-the-box model for ministry to children, youth and their parents. We run on 2 evenings each week at different parishes around the Scarborough Deanery and we rotate every 6 -8 weeks or so. Each block has its own theme which is carried through our Bible lesson, games, crafts, activities, songs and sometimes even snacks. The children have their program in one space while their caregivers are welcome to stay and have their own conversations in the Parents' Café. Both spaces have yielded growing friendships and connections. Here is a summary of where we have met, and how many children and parishes have been involved:

A few highlight moments from our evenings: squeals of delight as children looked for a flashlight in the dark to defeat the "Grog", creating an acrostic of the word BIBLE, our Day of the Dead celebrations, lying on a blanket outside trying to count stars, marching around a gingerbread Jericho and then eating the fallen down walls, hearing about amazing theological conversations in the car on the way home, hearing a 9 year old boy say, "I am so glad I joined this club!" This mid-week program is making a difference in these children's lives.

We received a Canada Summer Jobs grant. There were 2 weeks of VBS/Summer Camps in July. July 10-14 was run at Holy Trinity, Guildwood under the leadership of Denise Byard. There were 13 campers and 10 youth volunteers, the rest all from the Guildwood community. July 17-21 was at St. Timothy's, Agincourt, under Church of the Holy Wisdom and the directions

of myself. We had 7 campers and 7 youth volunteers, mostly from the St. Timothy's community. A third week, July 24 - 28, was attempted at St. Jude's, Wexford, but it was ultimately cancelled due to lack of registrations.

We created a website for Ignite (IgniteFamilyMinistry.com) and an Instagram account (@ignitefamilyministry), which are kept up to date providing information as well as printable promotional materials like posters and flyers.

In addition to the generous grant from Synod Council, Ignite has also received funds from the Anglican Foundation's "Say Yes to Kids" campaign (~\$2500) as well as a donation of the proceeds (~\$500) of the sale of a book written by one of our participants who tragically died this fall. This exceeds the amount of additional funding we had projected for our inaugural year!

There have been many adult volunteers who have provided snacks and fellowship for the Parents' Café and others who have assisted with the children's and youth programs.

This fall we welcomed Nikitha Stanley, from St. Bede's, as an intern. We are in the process of making her an official YMAP (Youth Ministry Apprenticeship Program) apprentice. Her presence with the program has been tremendously helpful. We have had other adult volunteers from St. Timothy's, St. Dunstan's, Holy Wisdom, St. Paul's, and Holy Trinity, Guildwood help out occasionally and not just when their home parish was hosting.

A debt of thanks to our Regional Dean, the Rev. Canon Greg Carpenter; his incredible "cheerleading" ability has helped move Ignite from a dream to reality. Denise Byard (Holy Trinity, Guildwood) for all her help in writing the grant proposal and for her experience and support in those first few blocks. To our hosting parishes and clergy: Rev. Canon Greg Carpenter (St. Jude's), Rev. Canon Andrea Christensen (St. Timothy's, Agincourt), Rev. Graham McCaffrey (St. Dunstan's), Rev. Gerlyn Henry (Holy Wisdom), Rev. Andrew Kaye (St. Margaret-in-the-Pines), Rev. Ravi Kalison (Christ Church Scarborough). Thank you for opening your Church buildings to us and for making us feel so welcome. Special thanks to Jillian Reeves (Holy Wisdom) for being such a wonderful host, snack maker, craft leader, driver, honorary Grandma, etc. She has travelled with Ignite, parish to parish, providing whatever is needed. She is a treasure!

Heading into 2024, Ignite endeavours to engage more of our Scarborough parishes and to grow our weekly numbers. Plans are already beginning for our Summer Camps, and we are looking forward to creating some larger Deanery-wide events.

PROPERTY

THE CHURCH:

- PACE ELEVATOR did the semi-annual service of the stair chair. The manual handle was provided (as mentioned, was missing last year) & batteries were changed. All is working well.
- MERSEY HEATING did the annual servicing of both furnaces & A/C's. Furnace filters were replaced every 8-9 months (purchased at MERSEY to receive 20% discount).
- HERBERT WILLIAMS did the annual fire extinguisher check. All ok with no replacements needed.
- JOHN JOHNSON continues to cut grass & plow snow. At no charge to us, he is filling in sink holes all around the grounds, where former tree stumps are rotting. Some soil has also been placed at the edges of the parking lot to help support it from cracking.
- HUNTER ELECTRIC (John) replaced two blown flood lights on the roof, still under the 5-year warranty. The ones we had are no longer available so compatible ones have been found to replace them.
- ENERCARE did maintenance service on the water heater the shut off valve on the tank was replaced.
- John was also called in to check on 4 blown sockets in the basement. The wiring has broken
 between the two south wall sockets. The right socket has been taken out of commission. Rewiring between the sockets is not an option as the wiring would have to be on the outside of
 the wall. Another possibility would be that a new socket could be installed on the southwest
 wall, to be connected to the men's room's electrical wiring. It was decided to leave things as
 they are for the time being (to see if it is really needed).
- ROGERS Alarm system still periodically sends false messages, especially re the 'water leak'
 monitor. There has not been water, the battery has been replaced (reading low), but ROGERS
 informs me it is a signal interruption due to the distance the monitor is from the front door &
 the fact that the signal needs to go through many cement block walls.
- ANODYNE AUDIO SYSTEMS (Derek Lawrence) who has taken over from retired Bryant Holinaty (NIAGARA ORGAN CO.) was called to service the organ. Derek is also a Roland piano specialist, should we need him for the piano. The organ is in good shape. In the meantime, where we'd been told the light fixture on the organ was defunct, it turned out only the bulb was burnt out. This has been replaced, with an extra one stored in the Sacristy (came 2 in a box). Thanks to Michael Johnson for cutting down to size, the broken plexi-glass hymn book support, drilling in new holes & reattaching it.
- WELLSPRING has experienced a couple of calamities; the cost being covered through them. One bathroom stall door in the Ladies had the hinges broken. Craig Sitwell installed two new 'gate hinges' to the door (The original type, being no longer available). I had ordered a replacement door stop for the same door, through Amazon, which he also installed. While here, he also tightened the door closer to the washroom door. (The original screws had worked loose, so it is now reinforced through the door.) A second issue for them was the smashing of the glass on the front of the oven door of the stove. A new stove was priced at approx. \$800 but thanks to Ryan Schwerdtner for finding a brand-new stove on Kijiji for \$350. He went to the west end of the city to pick it up; then, with John Hetherington's help, they carried it downstairs & installed it. He removed the old one & took it away for disposal all done in a day & in time for the Thanksgiving luncheon the next day.
- CRAIG SITWELL replaced the weather stripping on the back door, reinforced the door sill & installed two door sweeps, one on each side of the door.

- Thanks to David Zdunich for his continuing assistance in looking after the young trees on the property, pruning when necessary & trimming around the trees, looking after the flower bed under the sign, pulling weeds in the front flower beds & labyrinth.
- Mathew MacAskill replaced the office closet doors. The broken hardware under the original doors was no longer available for replacement. (Total cost of \$300 +\$150 labour +HST)
- Again, thanks to Michael Johnson for purchasing & replacing the burnt-out ceiling light (ballast gone) in the Ladies washroom. Also, after the heavy snowstorm last winter, Michael cut off the broken cedar trees on both sides at the front of the church & helped haul the brush away.

OTHER ITEMS:

- John Hetherington continues to monitor the security light system & replace burned out bulbs when necessary.
- One toilet was unplugged from 'food pieces' dumped down the toilet.
- rightmost kitchen sink drain unplugged elbow clogged with stir sticks, a pencil & sludge sink strainers purchased & put in each sink.
- CO & smoke detectors checked seasonally or as necessary
- clocks, timers, thermostats & lighting timers adjusted seasonally or as light conditions change.
- mouse traps & insect traps set or replaced as necessary
- both fridges have been pulled out & cleaned underneath
- one organ speaker in loft not working (cable cut) cable spliced & re-connected (working now)
- tarps over the knotweed seem to be working. Tarps straightened & spraying done on the shoots that have broken through
- window latch on the NE corner not catching latch adjusted & sprayed
- garbage on the lawn picked up when necessary. Thanks to GUILDWOOD DAY CLEAN-UP, most of the periphery of the yard was cleaned at that time. THANK YOU!
- there has been an off & on odour coming from the drain in the Ladies washroom on suggestion, I checked with BRADSHAW PLUMBING re: snaking the drains. The cost depends on "in house or to the street; storm & sanitary drains, or one or both; they'd need to be camera added (to check for damage)" @ \$119.50/hour.
- outside water connected/ disconnected & turned on & off seasonally
- the broken downstairs thermostat cover was fixed (unable to replace with the same size)
- hedges outside front door trimmed
- furnace room door handles tightened
- all toilet seats tightened
- the fruit fly infestation in the basement has meant a lot of frustration. Spraying seemed to have brought most of it under control. Thanks also for help from Denise & WELLSPRING.
- Thank you to Karen & Peter Price for helping put up & take down the Creche set & the outside coloured tree lights.
- The back door lock quit working frozen. Loose screws tightened & lock mechanism sprayed.

THE RECTORY:

- ABLE TREES did a follow-up to treat the Norway Maple on the front lawn, following the damage done to it by weather the year before.
- The dishwasher is not functioning properly & will be dealt with when Stephen is able to have someone come in to look at it.
- The kitchen ceiling light is not working changing bulbs was not useful. A new one will be purchased.
- A walkthrough was done & some issues found that will need to be addressed, the main costly
 one being that the outside of the back wall in the laundry room will need to be dug up & sealed.
 Water is seeping in through the foundation wall.
- Other "major" issues to be considered &/or dealt with replacing/repairing the kitchen cupboards & countertop around the sink, over to the dishwasher; countertop in main bathroom lifting loose; reattaching bifold doors in the basement; replacing curtain rods in the dining room. Michael MacAskill came in & will give a written estimate re what can be done in the kitchen to update it. He will be fixing the doors, replacing the dining room curtain rod & dealing with the lifting countertop.

Thank you to Denise Byard for coordinating this event. It was our best bazaar ever for time, talent and treasure, and raised \$10,100.

We received several grants this year: two from the Sharnagl Family Fund to support our food cupboard; one from Community Food Centres of Canada to support a Disability Without Poverty Town Hall meeting and one from the Ontario Government's program to support security measures in faith organizations. SYNOD REPORT FROM LAY MEMBER OF SYNOD

Pre-Synod and Regular Session of Synod

The Diocese of Toronto's 162nd Regular Session of Synod program included a pre-Synod meeting held virtually on October 21st (via an online event platform) to enhance Synod members' understanding of the items on the Regular Session of Synod agenda. It's summarized in a PDF document that you can download from this 2023 Regular Synod summary page on the Diocesan website.

Pre-Synod was followed by the Regular Session of Synod held in-person on November 17 – 18, 2023, in Richmond Hill. It was a large, high energy gathering of more than 500 people – including five of us from Holy Trinity, Guildwood (Rev. Canon Stephen Kirkegaard, Denise Byard, myself, as well as Tanya and Rohelio Sanxhaku representing youth, and Robbie Rhodes managing the Anglican Worship Resources Society booth).

A thorough summary of each day's highlights (including links to motions brought forward, Missional Moments, the bishop's Charge and other Synod documents/videos) can be found on the previously cited summary page on the Diocesan website. To avoid duplication, this report focuses on the meeting's core elements and aspects I found most relevant to our parish.

Theme and Bishop's Charge

Synod 2023's theme was the next stage of "Cast the Net": vision and calls. For reference, Cast the Net is the strategic visioning process that the Diocese's began in mid-2022 to help meet the challenges and opportunities the next five years will bring. It's based on John 21:14, when the resurrected Jesus told the disciples to cast their net to the other side of the boat, because the old ways no longer worked. Similarly, Cast the Net is designed to help us respond to God's call in familiar and different ways than before.

Bishop Andrew's charge dovetailed with Cast the Net and centred around 'stories' – our own and other's. Quoting James Smith in his book *Imagining the Kingdom: How Worship Works*, he said "we live into the stories that absorb us. We become the characters that captivate us. Then our actions become kind of a script" that we're unconsciously drawn into via our imaginations. His charge is also built on John 21:14, which he suggests outlines the script or series of actions that we've been drawn into over the past 15 months. After going through a time of COVID, we, like the disciples, are now invited to stand on a new threshold on the beach, looking to the future.

Beyond our own stories, Bishop Andrew stressed the importance of listening to other people's stories, to the extent that we are "absorbed into the telling" and use what we hear to inform our script. This process includes being absorbed into the telling of stories of pain, such as those of residential school survivors. He explained how some parishes (like ours) have heard, been absorbed and responded to hunger pangs in their communities with a food bank or a community garden. This subtlety is important for our parish to note as we move forward with our work on anti-racism, reconciliation and listening to the needs of vulnerable people in our community.

Appropriately, the First Nations Version of the New Testament was used for the morning service's Gospel reading. I think it forces you to listen with "fresh ears," as neither Jesus or the disciples are directly named but referenced by their dominant attributes, such as "one who hears" for Simon, "stand on the rock" for Peter and "creator sets free" for Jesus. As we've


previously done, it's inclusive and beneficial for us to use this version occasionally as we continue to work toward change and reconciliation.

In observing the majestic imagery this version paints, Bishop Andrew reminded us that all we do needs to "bring creation into the foreground of everything we do as servants of Christ." This focus aligns with our Earth Angels' work but it's also a reminder that each of us has a role in it. Cast the Net

Since the last Synod, the Cast the Net team asked clergy and lay leaders across the Diocese to imagine how we can be innovative in finding new ways of being church -- and listened to their answers. Michael Cooksey and Pat Murray shared their thoughts in one session, while Stephen and Denise gave input via several forums throughout the process.

The Cast the Net team distilled this input into a vision statement and 20 calls (endorsed at Synod). These calls are divided into four sections, as depicted in the following diagram:



You can find a summary of each section, as well as each call <u>listed on this page</u>. Some calls directly reflect our ministries at Holy Trinity, Guildwood, while others cite actions we may need to increase or adopt as we move forward. Central to all is this vision statement: "Followers of Jesus, inspired by the Holy Spirit, serve the world God loves!" It aligns well with our own vision and in November we began using it as our services' dismissal.

While these calls can be addressed concurrently, initial focus will be on "Renewing Spirituality" calls, which will begin in 2024 with a Season of Spiritual Renewal to deepen personal and collective discipleship and run until fall 2025.

Bishop Andrew also introduced:

 A <u>Cast and Learn Grant Program</u> – one-time grants to encourage parishes to take up the opportunity Cast the Net presents. These grants may be worth Holy Trinity, Guildwood pursuing.

- A Capital campaign to sustain ministry and help our most vulnerable communities. The
 intent is to design this campaign so that most of the funding remains in parishes to help
 at the frontline.
- A companionship program between the Diocese of Toronto and the Diocese of Brasilia and its Bishop – the Rt. Rev. Maurício José Araújo de Andrade, who was Synod's guest speaker.

Attendees responded positively to Cast the Net, but some expressed cautious optimism as "I hope we get it right this time." As most of the calls are high level, they're open to interpretation on exact scope and "how" they'll be implemented. At pre-Synod and Synod, attendees raised concerns about possible gaps, such as lack of reference to interfaith dialogue, ministry partnerships, mental health and hospitality/healthcare evangelism, as well as tangible actions for each. In Cast the Net's next phase, the team will produce a final report with detailed recommendations, which should close these gaps.

Governance and Pilot Project for Synod Council

Following a two-year pilot of a new governance structure for Synod Council, an evaluation, interim review and final review report were completed. Synod received this final report and approved its recommendation to make the new structure permanent. While the Synod Council has a defined mandate, its permanency is contingent on more comprehensive communication to the Diocese about its structure and the structure/mandate of each sub-committee. Similarly, the report includes an overall recommendation for more plain language communication (which I wholeheartedly endorse).

A number of Canons to formally establish the Synod Council were also passed at Synod, such as granting the Risk and Governance Committee (previously the Trusts Committee) decision-making authority. And a new Diocesan Minister was appointed to support the focus on planting and fostering new and innovative ministries. However, there are still some challenges to resolve, such as facilitating transition from a parish model (whereby for example, only the initiating parish is credited for collaborative initiatives) to a regionalization model (whereby credit for collaborative initiatives is shared).

Other governance-related Canons were brought forward and passed. The most relevant one for us is changes to Canon 14, which approved increasing the income threshold on parishes that require an audit to align with provincial legislation. Specifically, as a parish with annual revenue of less than \$500,000 in a given year, our vestry may now, with the bishop's approval, pass an extraordinary resolution with a compilation engagement for the financial year without an audit. However, we may continue to have an audit because omitting one could hinder our eligibility for external/non-Diocesan grants.

Creation Care, Justice and Reconciliation

The Diocese supports and challenges parishes to address climate change through education, prayer, liturgy, and advocacy in partnership with the wider church. Furthermore, it will work collaboratively to provide resources to help parishes reduce their carbon footprint.

There was also a follow-up to the "Net Zero Churches" model endorsed at the last Synod to help diocesan properties reduce Greenhouse Gases (GHGs) dramatically via heating and cooling system upgrades. This model includes a practical process to help parishes review their common policies, identify opportunities, and implement measurable changes. This year,

we all received a Heating Systems Data questionnaire to help ours and other parishes move towards completing a self-guided building and energy audit by our next building survey.

Deepening commitment to the Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action and promoting diversity, equity, inclusion and anti-racism remain priorities (and are integral to several Cast the Net calls). To that end, the Diocese is hiring a part-time diversity officer to help facilitate work in this area.

Care of the LGBTQ community also falls under this ministry and in the members' time, concerns, such as gender-neutral washrooms and a call for more gender-neutral terms in services, were raised. (At this point I believe Stephen has begun to do the latter, where feasible.) There is no immediate mandate for gender-neutral washrooms but it's helpful for leaders to know that there is a movement pushing for them.

The Diocese also continues to advocate at all government levels for:

- Adequate income supports, wages and working conditions that enable people to meet their basic needs and uphold human dignity and well-being.
- Affordable housing

To support these efforts, the Diocese approved this Social Justice Vestry Motion for 2023 that speaks to protecting and advancing the right to housing. (Note: Related resources will be added between November 2023 and early January 2024.)

Missional and Outreach Moments and Worship Opportunities

Throughout the pre-Synod meeting and two-day Synod, there were Missional Moment videos highlighting parish and Diocese initiatives (which are <u>archived here on the Diocese website</u>).

One memorable moment introduced the <u>"Hiking Church,"</u> which the Bishop's Committee on Creation Care developed. It connects participants with creation – noticing signs of life where creation is flourishing, as well as where it is stressed. We all thought this initiative might be a great fit for our church. (A <u>guide and resource document can be downloaded from this page</u> on the Diocesan website.)

Another moment featured the <u>2023 Scarborough Steeplechase and Holy Trinity, Guildwood's</u> <u>work</u> on this collaborative initiative, a moment of pride for our parish that we hope will help others.

And during the Member's Time, the interim Minister from St. Andrews by the Lake (Toronto Island), announced its move to a day retreat model and invited parishes to visit. Exploring this invitation may give us a dual opportunity to worship in another tranquil setting and gain insights to help inform our reconciliation work, as St. Andrews also supports a large Indigenous community.

Breakout Sessions:

Volunteering

Stephen attended a breakout session focused on volunteering and aptly named "Where have all the volunteers gone?" This session's presentation <u>can be downloaded from here</u> and offers some practical insights that would be valuable for all our leaders who work with volunteers to peruse.

Youth and Children's Ministry

Denise, Tanya and Rohelio attended a workshop on Youth and Children's ministry. (Its presentation is planned for release in 2024.)

Parish Properties and Affordable Housing

The Diocese's 2024-2025 plans and priorities have a strong focus on helping address the housing crisis through redeveloping and repurposing closed and vacant churches BUT not selling these assets.

I attended the affordable housing breakout and learned about the work in progress to develop a long-term blueprint, parish toolkits and a full pilot development project. So far, Synod Council has approved a Master Agreement that sets out a process, fee structure, and defines the framework for working with <u>Kindred Works</u> – a real estate company affiliated with the United Church and focused on property development that creates social, economic and sustainability benefits for everyone. It can help parishes navigate and complete processes, such as feasibility assessments, budgeting, tenant screening and facility management agreements.

The Diocese (via its recently established Property Resource Department) also aims to become an invaluable resource partner and trusted advisor to help active churches maximize the potential of Diocesan real estate. It's also reviewing property-related processes and procedures across the GTA to help make them more user-friendly, streamlined and accessible.

So, while we have no current plans to pursue affordable housing on our property or changing our property management strategy, the Diocese's heightened focus on these topics and resources they're producing may offer us some long-term benefits.

Financial Stewardship and Allotments

Post-pandemic, the Diocese has experienced a resurgence in revenue from the Marriott Hotel, which will continue to support its operating budget. However, the Finance Committee projects that investment income will remain lower than pre-pandemic levels for the next couple of years.

With church closures and reduced attendance post pandemic, parish allotments can no longer meet the Diocesan budget's primary financial needs, a motion was passed at the last Synod for Synod Council to present a detailed report on the possibility of covering past and future budget deficits using investment income rather than increasing parish assessments.

In response, the episcopal leadership changed to reflect this fiscal reality. The finance committee also explored all Diocesan investments for additional revenue sources but concluded that use and endowment restrictions make it impossible to leverage additional investment funds for operations, beyond those already in use. It also noted that it does not see increasing the assessment rate for parishes as an option to support the budget.

Therefore, to fund its operations and cover past and future deficits, the Diocese advised it will need to:

- Give financial priority to initiatives that are key for growth
- Reduce its operating budget, or ideally, increase revenue from alternate sources.
- Continue to explore alternate revenue streams, particularly strategic utilization of vacant and closed churches.

While the potential to repurpose/lease spaces offers sustainable ways to strengthen financial resources, Diocesan leaders stressed that any real estate use will be balanced with the need for affordable housing, particularly for vulnerable communities.
