The service we use today expresses our close relationship with God and with one another. Family and Priest, in consultation with each other, have selected what is apt for this memorial celebration of Freda's life.

God's loving care extends over all creation. Every life, including our own, is precious to God. Christians have always believed that there is hope in death as in life, and that there is renewed life, in Christ, after death, and yet, even those who share this faith find that there is a real feeling of loss at the death of a loved one.

The service of worship is found in the **green prayer book** - *Book of Alternative Services*. Hymns can be found in the **blue hymnal** *Common Praise*.



Holy Communion: All are welcome in this church and at this altar. All baptized persons, including children, are invited to receive the bread and wine at Christ's table. Those not receiving communion may wish to receive a blessing. Simply cross your hands over your chest to indicate you are not receiving communion. The Anglican

Church supports the ancient use of the common cup. Those receiving the chalice are asked to assist the chalice bearer by grasping the cup at the base and guiding the cup to their lips. For health purposes the practice of intinction, dipping the bread into the wine, is discouraged. If you do not wish to drink from the common cup, please feel free to receive the bread only. Simply cross your hands over your chest when the chalice bearer passes by to indicate you do not wish the wine. The ancient teaching is that the whole Christ is received whether one receives only the consecrated bread or both bread and wine. Please come forward (should you wish) to the altar rail, at the indication of the sides person (usher) to fill the altar rail from the outside in. Those with mobility concerns may also receive Holy Communion while remaining in place, please notify a sides person (usher).

As you are invited to stand, sit or kneel, please feel free to do as best fits your health, comfort and circumstances.

OBITUARY Freda Morgan 23 December, 1935 – 16 December, 2024

At 3pm on Monday 16th December, Freda started her final journey, just days before her 89th birthday.

With husband Barrie after 65 years of marriage holding her hand, she left us looking out the window of her own home, at the tree-filled street, and watching the neighbours walking their dogs.

Barrie, while deeply grieving, takes great comfort that he was able to keep this longtime heartfelt promise.

Also grieving are son Steve (Beverly), daughter Deb (Gary) and grand-daughter Emma.

As the eldest of five sisters, Freda was predeceased by Edna, Sheila, Yvonne, and Avril. Nieces Dawn and Karen in the UK are sharing in our grieving.

Freda leaves behind a long active life of working, social activities, travelling, and her loss will leave a big hole in many hearts.

The family's grateful thanks are offered to the palliative care team of PSWs, nurses and Doctors who showed incredible care and love in the final weeks of Freda's life.

Special thanks are also given to Reverend Canon Stephen Kirkegaard and the team of Parish Nurses who visited Freda and Barrie at home to give them their personal offers of support.

The service will be followed by refreshments in the lower level of the church.

Freda's final journey will end on the beach at Cresswell in Northumberland England, where she often played with her four younger sisters during and after the years of World War II.
